Pvt. Norman K. Kelly, son of Mr. and Mrs. Theodore Kelly, 2885 North Adams, is now attending with the 47th Airborne Field Artillery Battalion, the first phase of "Operation Snowbird." The first phase is being held at Natchez Trace State Park which is located nine miles north of Lexington, Tenn. The purpose of the maneuvers is to show the capability of airborne maneuverability in combat conditions. The training problems of true combat shows the soldier what to expect when he goes into live combat.

Pvt. Kelly has been serving on the radar section, Headquarters Battery 47th Airborne Field Artillery Battalion, 11th Airborne Division.

Kenny Treatments Aided by Funds From Torch Drive

Did you know there are more polio patients at the Sister Kenny Foundation from Oakland county than from any other district in the state? In September, 64 of the 195 outpatients receiving treatment in the Farmington hospital were from Oakland county. The hospital, the only Kenny foundation in the state, accommodates 49 patients. It is one of the seven located throughout the country.

In addition to a regular hospital staff, two other groups are essential to the Kenny treatment plan. They are the hot-packs and the Kenny therapists. All groups must have extensive training before they can qualify to serve. If there were only one patient in the hospital, it would be necessary to have three attendants on duty.

THE KENNY treatment makes use of the iron lung, rocking bed and hot-packs. When polio strikes, muscles are sore and stiff. Hot packs reduce pain and keep muscles flexible. The temperature ranges from 140 to 160 degrees. The curative power comes from applying the heat and letting it cool. Many patients have hot-packs throughout the day, a process which may continue for months.

Outpatients are helped at home by visiting nurses. Child patients return for check-ups and therapy three to six months after release and continue to do this throughout their entire growing period.

IN AUGUST, 41 new cases were reported, compared to 31 in September. Age groups are higher this year with one-third of the patients over 18 years.

Patients are admitted to the Kenny foundation on doctors' recommendations. No one is ever refused treatment. The Sister Kenny foundation activities are financed entirely by public contributions. It received money and gifts from various organizations.

The Sister Kenny foundation is one of the 150 community services receiving aid from Torch drive.

THE HOSPITAL appreciates the interest shown by various groups, especially the Farm bureau women and the women of Christ church Cranbrook.

The staff is interested in adult volunteers who could help in the late afternoon.

The hospital would like to provide more recreation such as listening to records and reading to the patients.

Two Petitions For Rezoning Set For Dec. 14

A request to rezone the southwest corner of Lincoln and Southfield, a single family to two-family bungalow will be aired at a public hearing Dec. 14.

Will Petition For Annexation

Location of a steel door company in Birmingham may mean annexation of a triangular parcel of industrial land now in Troy township. A petition for annexation is to be filed soon with both township and city.

The city has given a permit for sewer and water services, which will enter a parcel of the site already in Birmingham.

The biggest share of the plant would be outside the city at the end of Webster and Cole streets, and would provide a problem to the township to provide fire protection, owners believe.
