

# Protestants Unite in Reformation

Under the sponsorship of the Birmingham Council of Churches this community will observe the nationwide observance of Protestant Reformation Day on Sunday, Oct. 31, when several hundred worshippers will gather at 8 p.m. in the First Methodist church.

The Rev. Frank D. Slutz, D.D., will come from Dayton, Ohio, to address the group on "The Best News in the World". A well known educator, Dr. Slutz is a native of Ohio. He began his teaching career at a private school in Alliance, Ohio, serving as principal from 1904-06, leaving there to continue his work in Colorado.

His entire career has been spent in teaching and educational counseling in high schools and colleges.

DR. SLUTZ is a trustee of Mount Union college, Alliance, Ohio, the American Education Fellowship, Kappa Delta Pi, Sigma Nu, and several civic and church groups.

He is also active as a writer, including among his works "Human Factors in Business and Industry" and several contributions of educational literature for the Methodist church.

Held by the Ecole de Carillon at Malines, Belgium, the competition drew entries from Belgium, Holland, England, France and the United States.

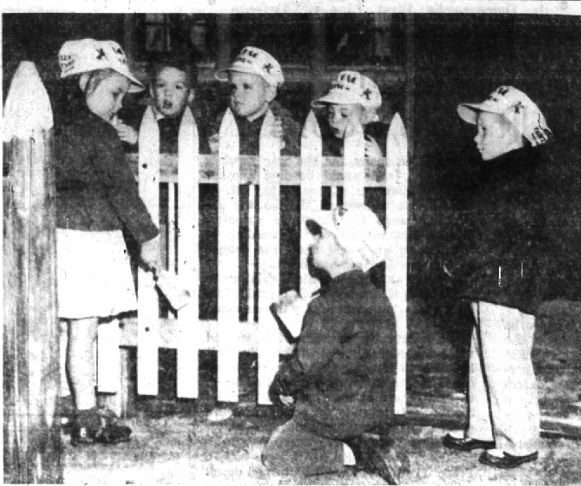
Marriott's composition was "Paraphrase on the old Flemish folksong, 'Den Walvisch Speelt met mis'."
