A Franklin village resident, arrested and charged with drunk driving in Birmingham on Sept. 10, was found guilty in Birmingham Justice court Friday.

Judge John J. Gaffill fined Mrs. Phyllis E. Bair, 25360 Devon, \$100 or 10 days in jail and ordered her driver's license sent to the secretary of state's office.

Mrs. Bair, who requested a jury trial on arraignment Oct. 1, did not take the witness stand to testify in her own behalf. Neither did she have a jury.

Her attorney filed an appeal for the decision with the county circuit court and Mrs. Bair was released on \$100 bond.

May I Introduce Myself?

I was born in Birmingham, Oakland County, Michigan, attended high school there, also Detroit Central High and the University of Detroit. I was recognized on the second All-American team in football in 1917 and served with the United States Navy in World War I.

I am married. Mrs. Allen and I live in Waterford Township. We have one daughter and one son who served in World War II with the Eighth Air Force, completing nineteen missions on three battle fronts over Germany.

I have always been active in Veterans affairs as well as other civic activities. I am Americanism Chairman of the Pontiac Lodge of Elks No. 810, Past Treasurer of the Oakland County Sportsmen's Club, Past President of the Oakland County Veterans and Historical Society, former President of the County Clerks' Association of the State of Michigan and served eight years as Secretary of the Association. I was instrumental in calling the first meeting on the Wisner Memorial Stadium and athletic field, which came to a successful conclusion. Also, I was honored by the Boys' Club of Pontiac as the "father of the year" in 1943.

I employ five young men, all ex-G.I.s who are doing a swell job for this office and for Oakland County.

May I call your attention to some of our latest accomplishments?

I have installed a new record system covering

births, deaths, marriages and naturalization. This system has been highly respected since installation in Oakland County and has been adopted by sixty-two of the eighty-three counties in the State of Michigan. I have also installed modern cash registers in both record and legal divisions which give an accurate account of each day's receipts, simplifying auditing.

In cooperation with the fact-finding committee employed by the Board of Supervisors, I have installed a single card index system for assumed names, copartnerships and corporations. By streamlining these records approximately \$1800.00 has been saved in equipment each year.

In approximately five and one-half years, with the aid of the Legislature and acts of the Board of Supervisors, this office has increased its revenue over \$37,500.00. I am now proud to announce that our budget is balanced. This is something never before accomplished in any other County Clerk's office.

I have requested microfilming of records of Oakland County as a protection against fire and other hazards. This will give more room in our already overcrowded vaults and save thousands of dollars in additional equipment. This matter is now in the hands of the Supervisors' Committee and the Board of Auditors for study.

I have been able to keep pace with the ever-growing population of Oakland County by the use of an educational program which pays dividends in service to the legal profession and citizens of the County and spells economy to the taxpayers.
