Roads in Quarton To Receive First Resurfacing Coat

A \$23,000 temporary resurfacing job of the five streets in Quarton Lake Estates subdivision can be done this fall if the assessment roll is confirmed without delay.

City Engineer L. R. Gare promised this week.

We are preparing to advertise for bids, and if the assessment roll is finalized in the next few weeks, we undoubtedly can get a contractor to put the job in this fall," he said.

Monday night city commissioners spent slightly over two hours listening to Quarton residents attempt to obtain only a resurfacing of present street widths.

However, an informal poll commissioners took of themselves majority was holding out for proper drainage to accom-

pany any permanent improvement of those streets.

SCHEDULED for this first step resurfacing are Lake Park, Fairfax, Puritan, Suffolk and Filgrim, all between Maple and Oak. Commissioners approved necessity of an assessment district for this work, and made it plain that it would be followed by a final surface treatment at a later date within several years from now.

Admitting present street surfaces were deteriorating badly, this first-course treatment would be made to keep the streets from getting any worse.

GARE ALSO was ordered to prepare working drawings and specifications for storm sewers on

the five streets, plus relief drains on both Pine and Raynald streets.

Although the Quarton residents, who filled the room to capacity, attempted to get commissioners to say what the final surface treatment would consist of and how wide it would be, the commission said there was no reason to make a decision now when it would not be binding on future commissions.

Will Move Street But Won't Vacate

An unimproved street connecting the east ends of Lincoln and Cole will not be vacated, but it may be moved 200 feet west.

Birmingham commissioners Monday night tabled a hearing regarding the street's vacation until Glenn Berry, 867 Madison, returns from vacation.

Berry appears to be the key figure in a pending real estate property holdings to be in one parcel and adjacent to a railroad siding.

The presently platted street would bisect the site, upon which Berry is reported to be planning a small industry.
