Glenn Cunningham Planning to Make Appearances Here

One of America's outstanding sports personalities will speak in Birmingham next week. He is Dr. Glenn Cunningham, noted track star of the early thirties, who now is an educator at youth.

Dr. Cunningham will speak on Tuesday, Sept. 28, at 1 p.m. in the Birmingham high school, where his appearance is sponsored by the student assembly.

His only other local speaking engagement will take place the next day, Wednesday, Sept. 29, at 8 p.m. in a meeting sponsored by the Birmingham Council of Education, at the First Baptist church of Birmingham, corner of Bates and Willets.

Dr. Cunningham has spoken in recent months to tens of thousands of students and their parents in Michigan.

Following an engagement in Cooley High School of Detroit, the principal wrote: "As principal of this school for nearly 26 years, I witnessed the greatest address reception given by any speaker in our history."

He will address an additional fifty-thousand students in this area in two weeks.

DR. GLENN CUNNINGHAM is known to millions in this country as the greatest American miler of our time.

He did most of his running during the 1930's and reached his greatest track performance when he ran a world record-breaking mile of 4 minutes, 4.4 seconds. He climaxed his college career at Kansas University by winning the

Low-Flying Plane Alarms Residents

The roar of a low-flying plane shortly before 8:30 p.m., Sept. 16, turned the glances of many of Birmingham persons toward the sky. The aircraft was identified as a B-36 giant bomber, powered by four jet engines and conventional propeller motors.

The craft, following a northwesterly course, flew over the city at an estimated 600 feet, landing lights blazing.

Richard Johnson, 1840 Highland, was the first to report the plane to Selfridge Field from this area. AF personnel there could not explain its presence in this area, saying they had had no flight plan filed for the bomber.

It was later revealed that the ship was bound for a Texas base and when over this section, was experiencing difficulty with two failing motors. Power was regained and the big ship continued its flight in safety.

Fete Legion Teams at Monday Banquet
