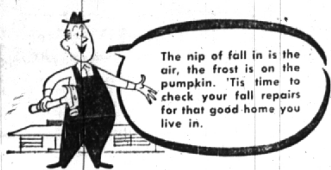


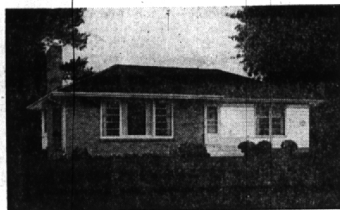
Chosen to College Cheerleading Squad

AAUW Reviews Museum Project At Opening Meet

New board members of the Birmingham American Association of University Women were announced by Mrs. Burley Laurimore, president, at the recent meeting at Cranbrook Institute of Science.

Mrs. Andre G. d'Iyevre, will head the membership committee; Mrs. Edward W. McNeil and Mrs. Fred J. Pinkauer, directors at large; Mrs. John E. Lane, arts; Mrs. Carl J. Theobald, fellowship; Mrs. S. K. Thungstad, Cranbrook museum project, and Mrs. J. R. Wagner, social studies.

Mrs. Laurimore introduced Dr. Robert T. Hart, institute director, who thanked the organization for the support given.

He expressed his desire that more and more people share in the project, pointing out that Cranbrook is the only science institute in the metropolitan area. The planetarium, used for the first time on Sept. 17, he cited as an additional attraction and reason for more persons to use institute facilities.

MRS. THINGSTAD summarized the work the association has done during the past two years to create additional interest in the museum. She said other groups were getting behind the project, with Junior League taking over a share of financial responsibility.

Their contribution will assure the services of Mrs. Doris N. McMillan, teacher and official guide at the museum for another two years.

Another innovation mentioned by Mrs. Thingstad, is the newly organized educational advisory committee.

THIS GROUP has been set up to coordinate the museum personnel and facilities with representative of the Birmingham school board, PTA Councils, and private and parochial schools in the area.

The AAUW is contributing funds to make an institutional film to be shown at schools, service clubs and other group meetings.

Mrs. Margaret M. Brayton, children's museum director of Detroit's schools, told of her experience abroad as representative of the International Council of Museums, under UNESCO.

She said the actual opportunity to see and handle an object is what stimulates children's minds, awakens creative faculties and helps to develop approaches they do not learn in text books.

"SITCASE" exhibits are especially important, she pointed out, saying, "They are full of objects that can be handled and are easily transported from school to school."

She added that some 12,000 such exhibits which average seven per school children, went out from the Detroit museum last year.

She praised the local program with Cranbrook museum and its unique resources and exhibits.

Already, 14 women have signed up for the class, but Mrs. Sproull says that there is a great need for as many volunteers as possible to work in area hospitals.

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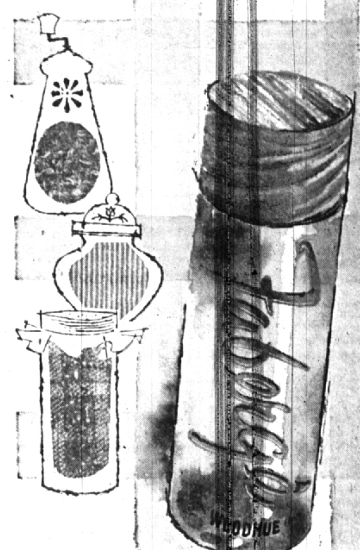
Newcomers Invite Husbands As Card Party Series Opens
