Colonel Analyzes Russia's Power

"How strong is Russia" will be topic for Col. Henry Willard Miller's talk to the Birmingham Woman's club on Oct. 5. Col. Miller, professor emeritus of engineering drawing at University of Michigan, is internationally recognized as an authority on artillery and railway ordnance.

His book, "The Paris Gun," published in 1939, is a well-known semi-popular work on the great cannon used by the Germans for long distance shelling. He has written extensively on gun and rail technical aspects.

CAUSES OF WARFARE and the varying characteristics of past and present-day combat has also attracted Col. Miller's extensive study.

His talk will follow a 1 p.m. dessert at the Baldwin Public library. Mrs. Harry Tromper as hostess will be assisted by board members of the women's club.
