Some of the Brownie and Scouts, ranging through sixth grade age, will meet at the new school, others in homes.

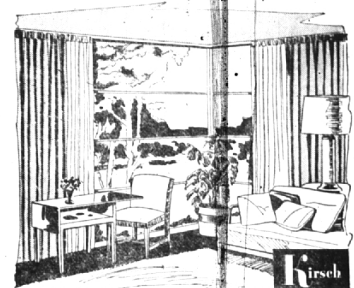
