**2 Men Arrested For Burglarizing S. Woodward Firm**

Two unemployed men arraigned on a breaking and entering count waived examination before Judge John C. Emery, Jr. in Birmingham Justice court Wednesday and were bound over to Oakland county circuit court.

Bond was set at \$2000 each, which neither man posted.

The accused are Antonino Javanti Nicosia, 27, of 2007 Maxwell, and Robert Joseph Modzelewski, 29, of 2007 Spencer, who await trial in Oakland county jail. They were arrested Tuesday at about 2 a.m.

They are accused of burglarizing the Electronic Service Co., at 1250 S. Woodward of property valued at approximately \$800, including a safe containing \$250 in cash and \$150 in checks, a portable television set and a radio. They admitted removing the items.

Entry was gained through a window, according to investigating Detective Sgt. Robert Schaulle.

Funeral services were held Tuesday at 2 p.m. at the Manly Bailey funeral home with Dr. W. Glen Harris of the First Presbyterian church. Burial followed at White Chapel cemetery.
