DAR Antique Show Purpose Is Explained

Birmingham's Piety Hill DAR chapter is going into the final planning stages for its fourth annual antique show, slated this year from Sept. 29 through Oct. 2 at the Community House. Hours for the show will be from 1 p.m. to 10:30 p.m., daily.

The affair is under the direction of Mrs. Walter A. Kleinert, assisted by Mrs. Frederic C. Pew, Jr., as- sisting. Mrs. Kleinert reports that many southern and eastern dealers had expressed a desire to return to Birmingham for the current show, under the supervision of Sam Yeagley of Annville, Pa., again named show manager. "A few dealers will be making their first appearance this year," Mrs. Kleinert said, "but all are being chosen on the merit of doing only in authentic antiques. Proceeds from this annual event are used solely for charitable purposes, going to DAR projects on national, state and community levels."

THIS YEAR Piety Hill will join forces with other Michigan chapters in building a craft center at the Kate Duncan Smith DAR school in Grant, Ala. To be called the "Hobby House," it will be a place where school students and the people of the surrounding mountainsides may sell their handiwork, thus aiding both community and school, Mrs. Kleinert explained.

A sizeable contribution, expected from the state DAR, is to purchase pine trees to be set out on a hundred-acre tract by the Michigan Conservation department to aid in the reforestation program for the state. Financial donations are being made to chapters in memory of deceased persons, thus assuring a living memorial to them. The over-all program is known as "The Memorial Planes."

AMONG THE other DAR activities are the scholarships which are renewed each year. One includes the cost of educating a girl student, including food and clothing, at the Tamassee DAR school in South Carolina.

Assisting with the cost of educating an Indian girl in Michigan is another project of the group. Among the area projects in which the DAR has a part is the Red Cross boxes and Ruth Ann dresses at Christmas, magazine subscriptions for men in the Dearborn Veterans hospital, donations to the Detroit Historical museum, books for Baldwin Public library, contributions to the Community House and funds for the Seize Eye-dog training school at Rochester.

A SPECIAL project this year will include the purchase of flags for two public buildings in Birmingham.
