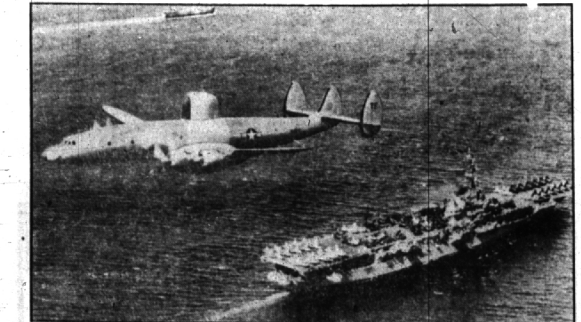

It was on the second floor of the building that early time Birmingham Masons met while Jim Hunt, on the first floor, practiced his drumming as customers couldn't hear the ritualistic work going on overhead. The building in 1916 was moved to make way for the present business block, was sawed in two, fixed up for tenants and rented for \$35 a month.

Table Army Request For Fire Support Of Nike Installation

SOUTHFIELD—Trustees Tuesday night tabled a request by the U.S. Army asking the township to furnish fire support to their Nike installation on 11 Mile road between Franklin and Inkster roads.

Objections to the request were raised because the army would not be responsible for damage or injury to township equipment or personnel.

WILLIAM ROESER, supervisor, pointed out that fire equipment might have trouble fighting a fire at the installation because of barricades and that special fire fighting problems might be too much for Southfield's small department.

"I'm sure that the request be respectfully denied," said Eugene Swen.

"You just can't do that to Uncle Sam," Roeser replied.

Township firemen will be instructed to inspect the installation and report back to the board before any decision is reached.

Police Get 2 Cars 1 Cream, 1 Green
