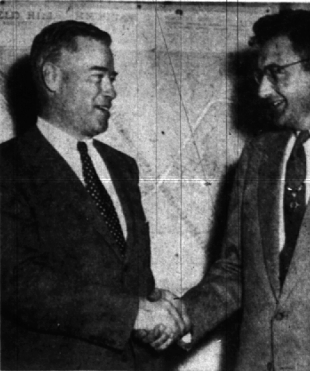

County Approves Incorporation Vote For 3 Communities

The Oakland County Board of Supervisors cleared the way Monday for three local communities seeking to incorporate...

NO MENTION was made of a bank permit, subject of the special meeting at which the council first received their decision and tabled the ordinance.

It was the bank permit approval that the council which two weeks ago caused violent protests from Lathrup citizens who felt their bank was opening up a mile road to commercial uses.

Monday's meeting was the organization of the council for its second year of existence. Campbell replaced Harvie as mayor, and Mackey took over as mayor pro tem.

CITY CLERK Mrs. Florence Bennett served into office Miss Kayser on Monday. She was re-elected, along with Mackey and Richard N. Cogger.

The council also accepted the resignation of James K. O'Leary, city attorney, and appointed E. H. Hapoy to succeed him.

By Monday's hearing on zoning, Mrs. Bennett and Campbell must have three copies of zoning maps to serve as the official zoning maps of the city.

The council meeting over Mr. Campbell became more and more animated by pleas of Mrs. Marvin I. Reed of 1835 Rainbow, to be more closely to parliamentary procedure.

The two clashed at the close of the meeting after Campbell had made for general discussion and Mrs. Reed took the floor to claim that unparliamentary procedure could lead to costly law suits.

"Are you a legal attorney?" said Campbell in an attempt to cut off Mrs. Reed after she had spoken at length on her own opinions on proper procedure.

"No," replied Mrs. Reed. "I think that you're out of your influence when you try to give us legal advice," Campbell said.

"I WAS NOT being anything but objective when I spoke earlier (on procedure)," said Mrs. Reed. "Whether we as a group have practiced the rules we are a corporation, and attorneys say that there is no court that will uphold that a zoning ordinance is illegal if arrived at by unparliamentary procedure."

Ex-councilman Reed, who next took the floor, told Campbell, "It's Monday night approval of a \$400 budget for 1935-36, an increase over last year of about \$11,000."

"Favoring the Monday public hearing ordinance, I'm much concerned about what's going on (along Southfield) but it should be studied thoroughly before anything is done."
