**Commission On Record Opposing City Income Tax**

Representative Richard C. Van Dusen and Senator William S. Bromfield were advised by the city commission that it has gone on record as opposed to the proposal permitting cities to levy an income tax.

SENATE BILL 1352 proposes to tax the income of those employed within their communities. This would mean that the income of a Birmingham citizen employed in Detroit would be taxed by the city of Detroit and vice versa.

THE COMMISSION stated that Birmingham residents are particularly vulnerable on such a tax, due to the fact that their incomes are derived from employment in other communities.

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**MIPA Session Due Tomorrow**

The 28th annual convention of the Michigan intercollegiate press association will convene tomorrow at the University of Michigan department of journalism.

The main speaker will be Dr. Edgar Dale, author of "How to Read a Newspaper" and "Audio-Visual Methods of Teaching." Dr. Dale will speak on "The High School Student and Mass Media."

Special program features will be yearbook production and the use of a camera in high school publications. Demonstrations will include staff procedure, staff organization and determining news values.
