### THINGS TO KEEP IN MIND

1. THE POTATOES are all eyes. They are already to plant as they come from the box. Each piece makes an eye—each eye makes a hill—each hill makes a lot of spuds.
2. CHILDREN (and helpful fathers), MOTHER'S DAY is May 8th. Watch this space next week for some thoughts that might help you over the hump.
3. STRAWBERRY SHORTCAKE STRAWBERRY SUNDAE STRAWBERRIES & CREAM  
If you can raise your own children you can raise your own strawberries.  
Michigan grown plants—25 to a package—full growing instructions, even the picture on the package is mouth-watering so there is no need to go hungry.

4. CRABGRASS will be with us again in 4 to 5 weeks. Three controlling methods will be suggested and the details (May 8th & 15th) will be given for them:  
a) Thick turf  
b) Actual plant killer  
c) Pre-emergence killer
5. LOCAL PURCHASING—We cannot recommend too strongly that the purchase of shrubs, trees, top-soil, peat, etc. be done through local sources which are in business here and feel a thorough responsibility to the customer and have a strong desire to remain in business here by providing the best in services and materials.
6. DO MOLES get under your skin? Well, do they get under your grass?  
A good control is to put CHLORDANE or LEAD ARSENATE down around the grass roots to kill the grubs which (we are told) is the main reason why the moles mosey around down there.
7. A full-sized man can get a great deal out of FERRY-MORSE Co.'s Midget Watermelon Seed. They mature in 65 days—whereas we have rarely seen the big get past middle-age.
8. If you don't get your lawn fertilizer in two or three weeks you are neglectful.

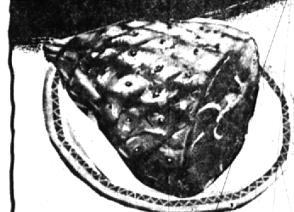
