### Complacency Scored By Church Leader

Sketching the lives of several of the leading prophets, the Rev. Eugene Carson Blake, D.D., told a meeting at the First Presbyterian church March 30, that religion, to be effective, has to be disturbing.

"A complacent religion," he said, "is most apt to be a false religion—a religion that in no way meets the needs of the people."

Although Dr. Blake is president of the National Council of Churches, he spoke as the stated clerk of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in the U.S.A. This is the highest office of the denomination can bestow.

"IT DISTURBS men and women through its demands. They set out to perform tasks harder than they could possibly have imagined and are so disturbed that they accomplish them."

He continued, saying that to be overly comfortable and always at peace in one's religious life is to court danger. He pointed out that this often fits the case in beautiful, prosperous churches.

"What is a church?", he asked

"It's not only a building; I imagine beautiful churches, such as yours, but actually it is the people who are religion. Whether they meet out of doors, in a shack or in a beautiful building, to get the full import of God's word, they must be disturbed."

"During the past few years we have witnessed an astonishing church growth. Splendid as that may be we see so little enthusiasm among the people—that the true value is lost."

"Expect to be disturbed by your religion. Expect your pastor to be disturbed by his. Any religion that does less can be falling all of you."
