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## STONE AGE

This is a hard subject to do anything with but since we are quite refreshed from our vacation—here we go.

Look sharp, feel sharp, be sharp! Put a real keen edge on your tools—such as pruning shears, hedge shears, axe, hoe, grasswhip, sickle, etc., with a HONING STONE.

STONE FRUITS 3 to 4 weeks from harvest should not be sprayed with insecticides and fungicides.

One good way to get your lawn mower ready for the repair shop is to run it into the curbstone or porch. If done at night you can see pretty sparks—sort of like when Indians make a fire with flint and steel.

PATIO BLOCKS are comprised of cement and sand and fine aggregate all of which are really stone in various sizes, they come in five pastel colors—can be laid in fine stone (sand) and it is simple for the man of the house to do.

POMPEIAN STONE bird baths, sun-dial pedestals (with or without sundials) and other interesting garden statuary. This stone is made in this country and does not, as often surmised, come from Italy.
