At Bloomfield Open Hunt club, their tennis courts, new this year, and their pool, new last year, are busy each day—but the courts more often in the cooler morning hours.

Activities are centering around horses there, with attention on training and learning points of horsemanship as well as an interest in that of enjoying the sport in the open air.

AT ORCHARD LAKE, the lakefront is a bustling spot with 25 sailboats, a cruiser used by waterfront director Frank Wallin in teaching the rudiments of sailing, and several rowboats. All used frequently.

Swimming is taught there by Robert Boyce, who in winter

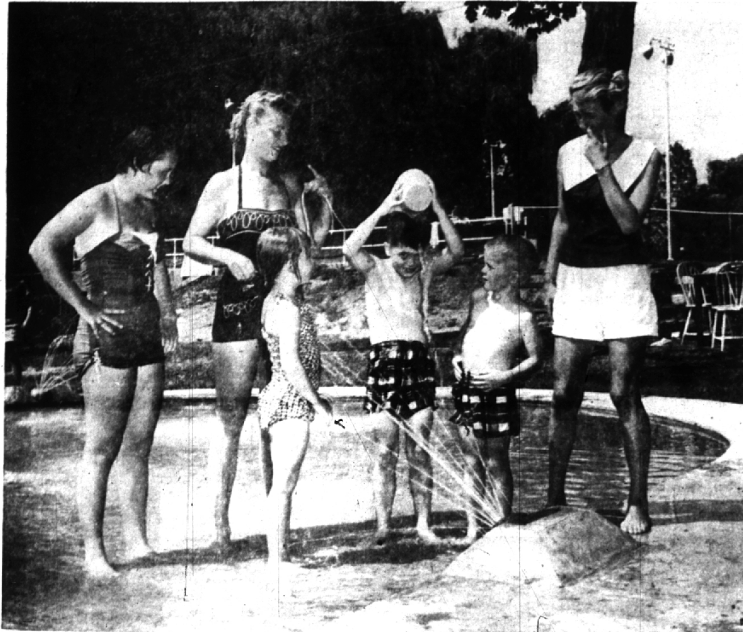
teaches the sport in Pontiac schools. Wallin is a teacher of European history at Wayne university.

Just a Little Spray for Cooling Little Tots

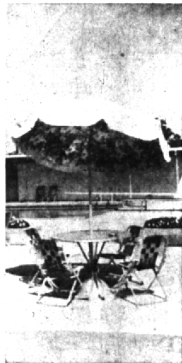

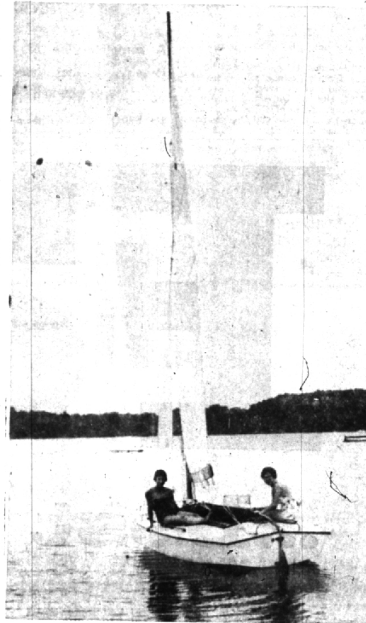

Poolside Fun Is Warmer Than Afloat

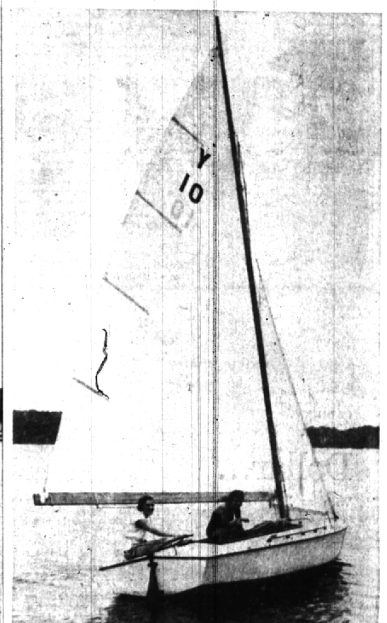
BLOOMFIELD OPEN Hunt's swimming pool, sparkling in morning light, is larger than most in the area, has special cleaning system.
