## Main Reports Progress on John R Sewer

**TROY**—A report of preliminary study of the proposed sanitary interceptor along John R. by Ralph A. Main, Oakland county drain commissioner, to the township board Monday, revealed that Detroit has agreed to accept 20 cubic feet of sewage per second into their system from the interceptor.

This would end most of Troy's sewer problems for some time to come. With the quota of 15 million gallons per day flowing to the Detroit treatment plant, Troy would handle from 100,000 to 150,000 residents, Main told the board.

He also suggested, according to Norman R. Barnard, township supervisor, that the board resign its thinking concerning density of population.

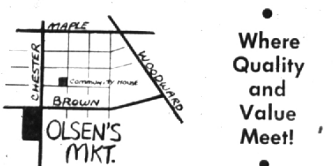
Main suggested provisions for larger lots for use in home-building. The flow to Detroit would serve an estimated two families per acre, and with present 150 sides for home construction, the number of people to be served would someday outnumber those who could be served by the interceptor.

MAIN also discussed two other systems which serve a fraction of the township, Barnard said. These are the 12-Town drain and the Southeastern Oakland county system. Most of Troy's sanitary sewage, however, would go down the John R. line.

Barnard and Main were asked by the board to continue work on the interceptor project with an eye on the cost of such a system and possible ways of financing it.

Barnard indicated that a temporary sewage route might be developed through the Southeastern outlet until the John R. drain is completed. There is also a possibility that Royal Oak township might join the John R. project, according to Barnard.

## Police Use Guns, Squad Car to Halt Reckless Motorist

An 18-year-old Birmingham youth pleaded guilty Monday to reckless driving after he was caught early Monday morning by police who were led on a high speed chase which started at Woodward and ended only when they emptied their revolvers and damaged their car in halting the youth's auto.

Gerald Stamp of 1395 Holland, the driver, and a companion Russell E. Clark, 17 of 288 George, were chased past Stamp's home to the Porritt property of Haines, Clark surrendered. Stamp fled on foot but was later arrested at his home.

Patrolmen Joseph Buckles and Lawrence Winkelman said they fired in the air in attempts to halt the car and damaged the side of their squad car, only one month old, in bringing the Stamp auto to a halt.

Stamp was told to pay \$50 fine or 15 days in jail, or enter the army. He has one week to elect.

Clark, who pleaded guilty to leaving drunk and disorderly, will appear Monday before Justice John J. Caffery for sentencing.

## To Fix Roofs

Roof repairs for six schools in the Birmingham school district have been approved by the board. Roofs will be made on Birmingham high school, Barnum junior high, and Pierce, Adams, Johnson and Quanton elementary schools.

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
