THE SECOND major project was the new ceiling in the lounge, condensed by Birmingham's building inspector. This entailed removing the old ceiling, re-inforcing supporting beams, retreating the roof and

adding fire resistant and acoustical soundproofing material. Enrollment for classes, which start Sept. 19, will begin at the House office Sept. 6.
