WHEN THE COUPLE left for a wedding trip to Virginia, the bride had changed into a navy cotton suit with navy and red accessories.

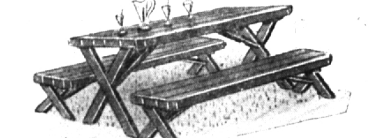
The couple will make their home in Warwick, Va.
