Propose City Tree Program

LATHRUP—Leonard Watchowski, city administrator, said this week he would recommend to the city's tree committee that a permanent, effective program of trimming and spraying of city trees go into effect next year.

Watchowski said such a program, aimed at controlling Dutch elm disease, would probably be financed through a general assessment. "One mill in the budget would bring in \$6,000," Watchowski said. "This would cover \$2,000 for spraying equipment and leave enough to allow for hiring of one man and the cost of the spray to take care of the entire city."

THERE ARE an estimated 4,000 elm trees in the city. Every street is lined with large elms, Watchowski said, and they should be trimmed and sprayed twice each year. So far this year the State has condemned 37 such trees.

Spraying to date has been on an individual basis, said Watchowski, who added that the only spraying done by the city is on diseased trees that are removed and later burned.

Each large elm tree that is removed costs the city about \$50 to \$75, Watchowski said his program would take the problem out of the hands of the individual home owner and make it a city responsibility.

Gas Suit Principals To File Summaries

LATHRUP—Highland Oil Company, with the completion of testimony in its suit against the city to force Lathrup to grant it a building permit, has two weeks in which to file a summary of its case with Oakland County Circuit Judge Frank L. Doty.

The city will then be given two weeks to file an answering summary or brief, and then the two will be given an opportunity in court to argue the evidence before the judge renders his opinion.
