### Speed Ordinance Being Prepared Says Roseberry

FRANKLIN—Village Attorney William Hartman is drafting an ordinance that should be put into effect at the Sept. 12 council meeting according to David A. Roseberry, village president.

The ordinance will establish a "no parking" area along the commercial frontage in the center of the village, and will provide a 25 mile per hour speed limit on all roads in the village except two.

These two, a strip of Franklin road and 13 Mile road, will carry a speed limit of 35 miles per hour, Roseberry said.

"It is an attempt to stop 60, 70, and 80 mile per hour speeds on Franklin road through the heart of the village," said Roseberry.

One speedster was clocked at 72 miles per hour through the heart of the village, said Roseberry.

### Want Charter Completed in Two Meetings

SOUTHFIELD—One, or possibly two more meetings, should see the final draft of the city's proposed charter completed and ready for a vote, according to Eugene Swann, township supervisor and commission chairman.

Swann said that about half of the charter remains to be completed but most of it is in a matter of placing it into a chapter. Next Wednesday's meeting should be the last, and if necessary a final meeting will be held this Saturday, Swann said.

TAXING and bonding limitations are the main points yet to be smoothed out, Swann said, and after a final draft of the charter has been completed and before it is sent to Gov. Williams, township residents will have a chance to air their opinions at a public hearing.

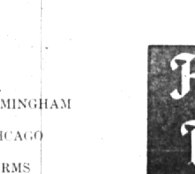
No date has been set for the public hearing but before such a hearing is called to order, those wishing a copy of a digest of the charter should be able to obtain one at the township hall, according to Swann.
