mingham fans watched the Detroiters score eight runs in the first two innings, while the local all-stars could manage only one single in the game. (Eccentric Photo)

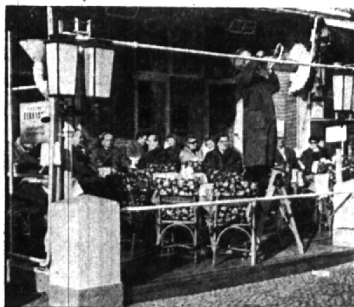


Six on MPSE Chapter Board Are from Birmingham Area
