

Talks on Peron, Attends Convo, And Entertains

"Peron is juggling three balls in Argentina—the army, church and labor," says Mrs. F. G. Garrison, who talked recently at a Rotary luncheon meeting on her knowledge of the controversial South American.

Having known Peron for almost 25 years, Mrs. Garrison saw him last about 2 and a half years ago. She met him when the Garrisons were living in Argentina, where Garrison was a public relations man with a telephone firm.

"I DON'T THINK he'll get out of his job until he wants," Mrs. Garrison says of Peron, who recently was excommunicated for his treatment of church officials. She expects that probable negotiations now underway will bring about a reasonable conclusion, with Peron being taken back by the church.

"He is a very shrewd man," she says. "He's the best politician I've ever come in contact with, and uses a lot of military strategy in his politics. He has written several books on military strategy, says Mrs. Garrison, who has been known many state and national politicians.

MRS. GARRISON has just returned from a Crippled Children's Commission conference at Market Island's Grand Hotel, held in conjunction with the medical association's meeting there. Guests here for three weeks are Garrison's father and mother, who arrived last week from Houston, Tex. This weekend, 14 relatives of Garrison will be arriving for a family reunion. For most, it will be first view of the Garrison's new home at 120 Interlaken drive, West Hixsonville township.

DOWN TO EARTH

English Walnut Can Grow Here

Many of our readers have acreage and I would surely suggest to them that they consider growing English walnut trees. There is a variety, Colby, which has a record of prospering in winters as cold as 19 degrees below zero.

This variety was brought from the Carpathian Mts. by a Canadian missionary in 1934 and sent to Cornell University for planting. Now it is well received by Michigan Nurseries.

It bears a medium sized nut with a thin shell. We have a fine local gardener to introduce to you, one James Gully, on Emmison's street.

He came here over 30 years ago from Stock land and has received over 200 blue ribbons for the quality of his flowers he grows. Many state championships have been his at the state fair. He served his apprenticeship in Ayrshire, Scotland with Sir James Knox.

DELPHINIUMS are Gully's specialty. He starts his seeds in a pot in February with a mixture of leaf mold, sand and soil. When the seedling has three leaves he transplants them to a flat. Later when there is no danger of frost he sets the new plants outdoors.

When the plants are grown for exhibition purposes he allows them to develop only four stalks. This gardener has a care for black not he will be glad to share with any gardener.

To avoid the worm, he makes a dressing of coal and rough sand ashes which he places on the plant crown in the spring.

WHEN NEW stock is needed Gully sends to Bath, England, for good quality hybrid seed and always gets 100 percent germination. The favorite color from his was for the oval purple colored variety, Michael Blackmore, which had a purple "bee" in the middle of the flower.

IN JULY and August he makes his cuttings from his garden every three weeks for his nursery. He cuts the new wood, and covers the slip with a glass jar. The way grandmother always made cuttings and new plants from her favorite roses.

The location is in the shade where the soil is moist. The glass jar remains over the top all winter. He had a shrub I hadn't seen before, Spirea Palatinata, which can take part shade and will grow to three feet high.

You must drop by and see this fine garden in an older part of Birmingham where families once would have had a vacant lot for the boys' fun. This later converted the "vacant" into a garden of rare beauty. Here is a successful garden with a show of color for every season years you have been told about the mallows, hembucks, lowwood, etc.
