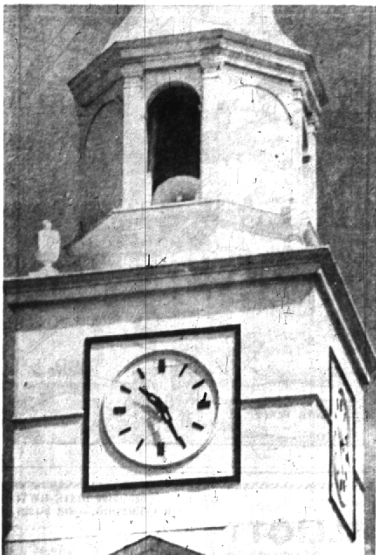


Ten Commandments for Modern Parents

- III—Give your children a share in the tasks and creative activities of the home. Through taking responsibilities in accordance with their strength, they will grow in character and increase in resourcefulness.
- IV—LOOK for good which you can praise more than for faults which you must condemn. Children generously encouraged try to improve still more, but those too much condemned lose heart and expect little good of themselves.
- V—Value curiosity in your children and stimulate in them the love of all things true and beautiful. By rewarding their inquiries and developing their appreciations you inspire them to a larger growth.
- VI—Teach your children to convert obstacles into opportunities. Strength develops by firm purpose and by creative conquest of difficulty.
- VII—DEVELOP in yourself such qualities as you want your children to have. Honesty, consideration, courage—such virtues come mainly by contagion and example.
- VIII—Make your home a center of friendship and good neighborliness. Its ties of comradeship will prepare members for good citizenship in the community, the nation, and the world.
- IX—Share with your children in the fellowship of the church. This will give them the sustaining strength of a community of faith and love which extends across the ages and embraces all people.
- X—Lead your children into faith in God that they may be workers with God in overcoming evil and promoting the good. This will be aided by thought-sharing, religious interpretation and worship in the home and by living in the Spirit of Christ.
