# County Agent Advises that Fish Are Perishable

When the family announces they're going fishing, it's the housewife's cue to get caught up on fish lore, says Mrs. Mary A. Hixon, Oakland county home demonstration agent.

She reminds fishermen's families that fish are very perishable. If fish are not going to be used immediately, they should be wrapped in moisture proof paper or placed in a tightly covered dish so fishy odors will not develop in all other food in the refrigerator.

STORE THE FISH in the coldest place in the refrigerator, Mrs. Hixon says, and be sure to clean it before storing.

Fish odor problems on hands or dishes are easily solved, according to this homemaking expert. She advises just rub your hands and dishes well with moistened salt, then rinse with hot water before washing with soap and water.

To freeze fish, Mrs. Hixon warns that they should be wrapped in moisture, vaporproof freezer paper, then in heavy wrapping paper and frozen immediately.

READY TO COOK frozen fish does not need to be thawed before cooking, but you should plan on a little longer cooking time. If an egg and crumb coating is to be added, the fish will have to be thawed.

Because fish spoils rapidly, never planed by the couple.
