The Oldens leave Dec. 7 for a few days vacation in New York City where they plan on seeing some shows and completing their Christmas shopping.

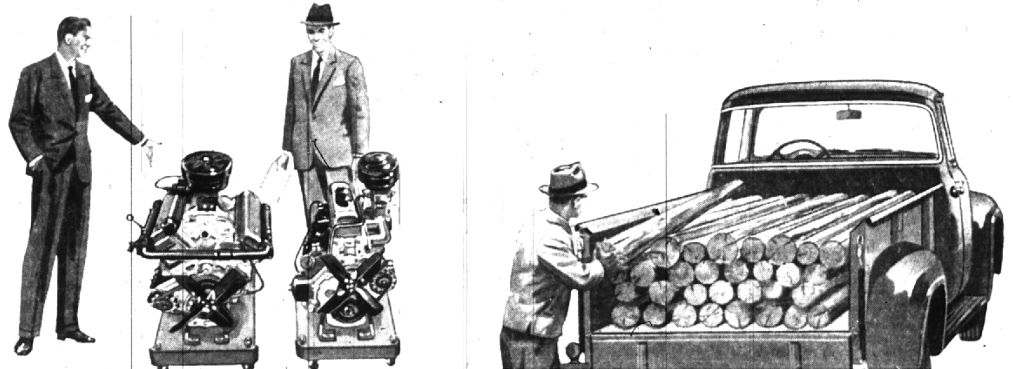
Mr. and Mrs. Harry J. Peckholder of South Glenary road have spent the last week enjoying the sights of New York.
