BIRMINGHAM can into a Royal Oak team that was really "up" for them Thanksgiving morning.

This was the fourth straight Acorn victory in the series which now stands at 23-11 in favor of Royal Oak. Birmingham last year in 1961 during the "Tom Tracy era."
