Suggest Re-Zoning In Sections 25, 31; Hearing Is Jan. 5

SOUTHFIELD—Public hearings on rezoning of residential properties in Sections 25 and 31, has been set for 8 p.m. Jan. 5, at Southfield-Ten school, 10 Mile and Berg roads.

Proposals by township zoning board, would amend Ordinance 118 the town hip's zoning ordinance.

According to Robert F. Wierfel, zoning board secretary, the board is considering the rezoning, from R-1 to R-2, of lots 141, 142, 143, 217-220, and lots 220-229 of the Grand River Park subdivision in Sec. 31.

They also have proposed an upgrade from R-2 to R-3 in all of Section 25.

Copies of the proposed amendment and zoning ordinance maps will be available at the township offices during regular working hours, according to Wierfel.

Appeals Bd. Okays Country Day Site

SOUTHFIELD—Board of Appeals members okayed construction of Detroit country day school on 13 Mile and Lathrup road, after it would be 100 feet from homes on the south and at least 200 feet from the school's western boundaries.

Board member Eugene Swen, township supervisor, said the school enrollment has been limited to 400 pupils, adding that school grounds must thank the southern officials saw a peak enrollment of 350 pupils.

Another stipulation, Swen said, was shifting of the playground, south of the school, to the east on the south and at least 200 feet from the school's western boundaries.

No lighting for night activities will be permitted, and 30-foot trees must be planted along the southern and western boundaries.
