These 5,000 students will be taking the final examination on Dec. 31, 1956 at the nationwide talent search currently being conducted by the National Merit Scholarship corporation.

At stake this year are at least 225 four-year college scholarships valued at over \$2,500,000.

AMONG THE 5,000 winners announced recently were Albert R. Ratzel, of Westwood, Birmingham; Marie Joant, of Mountain Brook; Terry, of Norfolk; and James E. Tran, of Jackson Park drive.

From Bloomfield Hills: Paul R. Gardick, of Quaker, and Charles F. Perry, of Penitence, were selected.

The area winners announced were high scorers among 60,000 hand-picked students who took the merit examinations in October preliminary screening tests.

Troy Youth Tries For Scholarship In Science Field

Charles Brock, son of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Brock, 6570 Liverpool, Troy, recently wrote the preliminary examination in the Science Talent search for Westinghouse scholarships.

Conducted for the fifteenth year by Science Clubs of America and administered by Science Service, the examination was given to Brock at Troy high school under the direction of teacher R. Smith.

The purpose of the contest is to discover and foster education of students with skill, talent and creative originality in science.

A \$2,400 Westinghouse Grand Science scholarship will go to the top national winner in the science talent search.
