Troy township's incorporation petition was approved March 20 along with petitions from Bingham Falls subdivision and Southfield township.

Eidon D. Quizer, 43, was found guilty of manslaughter by circuit court in the Feb. 11 automobile death of Charles Vincent, 60.

A zoning ordinance was tabled and a \$170,000 bank building was approved in Lathrup, with council members John Campbell and Kathryn Feyserehen objecting to tabling.

League of Women Voters failed to endorse the Shain Park move, but approved the skating rink and Evergreen Interceptor proposals on the April 4 ballot.

Issue of March 31
Close to 4,000 voters were expected to turn out April 4 for the annual city election, though 12,309 were eligible to vote. Birmingham city planners said they were in no position to actively support the city commission's proposal to relocate Shain park, as the vote on April 4 neared.

Mrs. John VanderRoest was elected head of the PTA council on March 29, and Mrs. Edward Lloyd president of the Southfield council. Mrs. William O. Merrill attended the state woman's club convention in her wheel chair.

Ever H. Rollins was elected Bingham district governor at a Windsor convention. The new hand-wrought hospital at St. James Episcopal church was receiving liturgical art acclaim. Palm, Sunday services were slated in local churches.

About 300 attended Southfield township meeting on Evergreen interceptor preliminary to April 4 vote on it. In Lathrup, seeking council posts were Richard Cogger, Kathryn Feyserehen, William G. Kronauge, Lantz Mackey, David Redwood, and Thomas Reed. Lathrup residents demanded the bank building permit recently approved be remanded.

Issue of April 7
Manley Bailey, Mrs. Howard Willett and Harry Jernys won seats on Birmingham commission, the ice rink was endorsed, and 4,021 voters downed 1,067, deciding that Shain Park should not

April 8 Good Friday services and Easter services were set at most local churches, with noon service at First Presbyterian.

Doug Lewis was given football trophy for sports excellence after his team won East Michigan League title.

Issue of April 11
April 12 announcement from Ann Arbor that the Salk vaccine had come through 90 per cent of effective against polio set off final frenzied activity in Birmingham area preparations to inaugurate the 1955 immunization campaign. Mrs. Howard Roman was chairing the county group.
