

**Choir from Russian Church Sings Here**

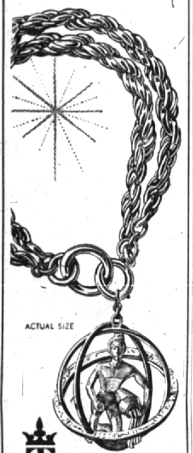
