LWV to Consider School State Aid

February unit meetings of the Birmingham League of Women Voters will be devoted to a study of the distribution of state aid to schools. The program is being prepared by members of the state tax action committee, Mrs. Robert Voss, chairman.

The position taken by the League of Women Voters previously is that state aid to schools should be distributed on a basis of need and minimum standards, rather than, as at present, partly on a basis of population.

This position will be explained, and the discussion group will try to agree on specific standards by which to judge tax legislation which may be proposed during this current session of the legislature.

Among the bills expected to come up, and upon which the League of Women Voters may wish to take action, are the school aid bill of 1955, a possible bill to eliminate and force merger of districts operating no schools, and a bill to reify the school laws.

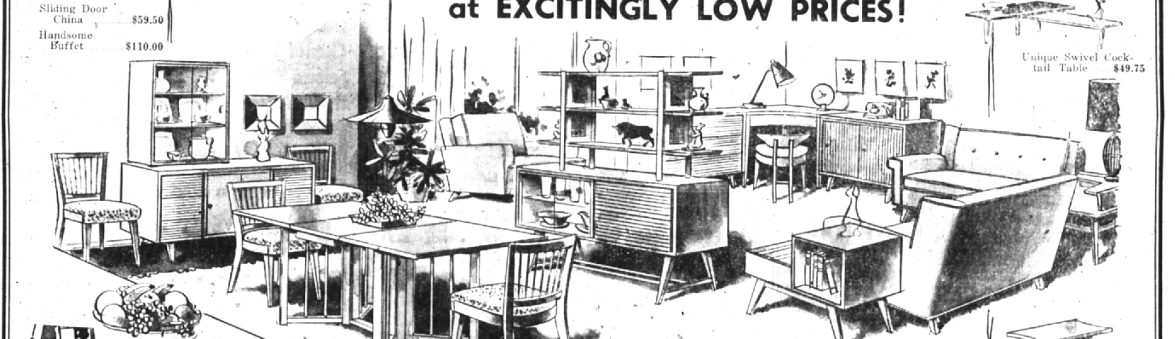
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
