Conquest of Fear Is Lecture Topic

Restoration of health and usefulness through spiritual means, as illustrated in the Bible, will be the subject of a lecture on Christian Science which George Nay of Chicago will give here Feb. 13.

A member of the Christian Science board of lecturers, Nay will speak in the Baldwin school auditorium under the auspices of the First Church of Christ, Scientist. His topic will be "Christian Science, the Conquest of Fear."

NAY WAS BORN in Hungary and holds a degree in architectural engineering from the Budapest Polytechnic institute.

Since coming to this country in 1913, he has helped in the design, supervision and construction of many eastern and mid-west buildings.

He has devoted full time to the practice of Christian Science since 1937, traveling throughout the United States and several foreign countries.

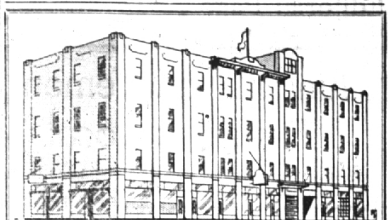

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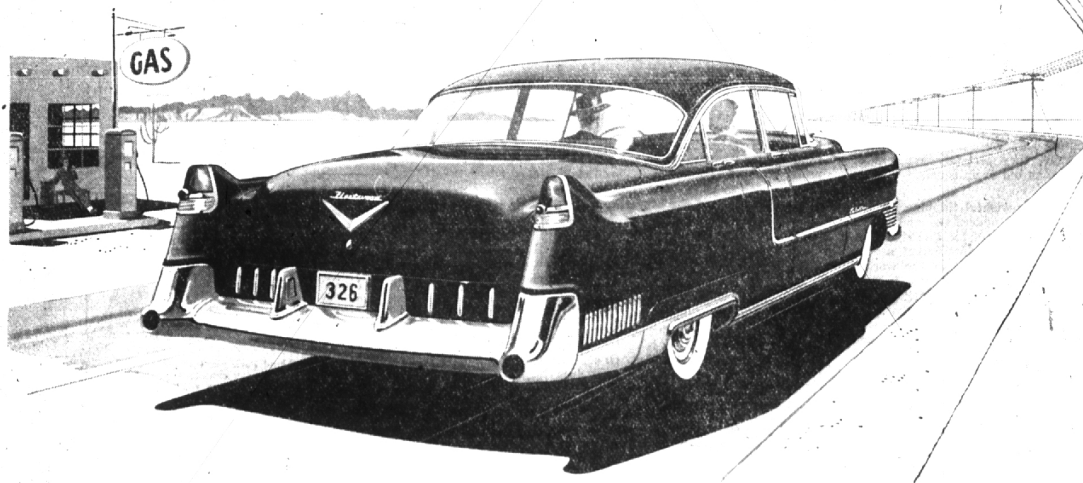
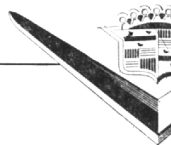
