

BHS Addition Opens, Another Is Approved

At a special Monday night meeting, Birmingham board of Education members awarded contracts for an 11-room addition to the high school.

The same day, an eight-room addition, begun last August, was opened for student use.

The new addition, which will include an extensive basement area for use by music classes, will cost \$479,474.

Successful bidder for the general construction contract was the R. Stewart Co., Inc., Detroit con-

tractors, with a bid of \$357,900.

W. Willor White, also of Detroit, was low bidder on the plumbing, heating and ventilating work involved, at a cost of \$83,140.

HAMILL Electric Co., another Detroit firm, won the bid to install electrical work at \$38,884.

Richard Featherstone, principal of Terry school and assistant to School Superintendent Dwight B. Ireland in school construction, said the new structure should be ready for use sometime next fall, although its opening in time for the start of the September semester is unlikely.

The addition which opened this week has eight classrooms in addition to an enlarged cafeteria and library. Total cost of this unit was \$357,251.



Awnet Invention Wins Approval

PHILADELPHIA — A Birmingham sales engineer may soon parlay a five-minute appearance on The Big Idea television program in Philadelphia Feb. 15 into a lucrative business venture.

The program, produced by Donn Bennett, introduces newly patented inventions, along with their inventors each week to the television viewing area and a studio audience which selects a winner.

Duncan Hudson, 1610 S. Bates, employed by General Motors, won the audience award over three other inventors appearing with him. He demonstrated his Awnet, an antique and inexpensive device for protecting open windows from rain and sun damage.

Since Hudson's appearance on the show, Bennett has received a number of queries from manufacturers seeking more information in hopes of putting the Awnet on the market. The inquiries are being relayed to Hudson following screening by The Big Idea staff.

Hudson's invention consists of a number of narrow strips of aluminum folded in accordion fashion and clipped to the screen on a door or window. The strips act as miniature individual awnings which let in the light, but keep out even a driving rain.




