Although a Birmingham resident for only six years, Bradler Pruden, 491 Hanna, moved from the city this week but took with him an unusually broad civic experience obtained from his association with city and county governmental and service groups.

Pruden took over a new position Tuesday as vice president-engineer for Ric-Wil, Inc., Barborton, Ohio.

The new post, will be in the manufacturing field of insulated piping, mainly in the industrial field.

DURING HIS residence here he has been associated with Giffels and Vallet, Detroit architects.

Pruden has worked here since the formation of the original building code committee in 1940, and has been a member of that body's board of appeals.

Four Research Scientists Plan Seminar

Four leading research scientists will conduct an unusual day-long seminar on "Research: a Tool of Science," Feb. 4, at Cranbrook School, according to an announcement by William Schultz, Jr., head of the school's science department.

Junior and senior girls from Kingswood Senior Cranbrook and boys from Cranbrook School will learn how research techniques are applied to specific projects in medicine, industry, and human relations.

Advances in the study of antibiotics and other medicines will be discussed by Dr. John Ehrlich, bacteriologist of Parke, Davis and Co. at a 9 a.m. meeting. Dr. T. A. Boyd, research consultant of the General Motors Corp. will outline the techniques of research in the automobile industry at 10:30 a.m.

Basic chemical and physical investigations conducted by the paint industry will be summarized by N. P. Beckwith, vice president of the Rinsheed-Mason Co. at 1 p.m. At an evening session Dr. Henry J. Gomberg, assistant director of the University of Michigan Project will indicate some of the many constructive applications now being planned for atomic energy.

Public Hearing On Zoning Change

A public hearing on a proposed change in zoning restrictions to permit greater commercial use of frame houses in the Birmingham business district will be held Monday before city commission.

The commission has had under consideration since Nov. 15 the amendment which would allow a maximum of 1,000 square feet of the first floor area of any frame building in locations zoned business A and B to be used as business space.

Restrictions in the zoning amendment, however, would prevent such use for any purpose other than as business or professional office space.

NO RETAIL trade could be conducted, no stock in trade kept, or any commodities sold.

The building code board of appeals previously did not approve the amendment, voting unanimously against a change in the present code.

Owners of such property, or others concerned, are invited to attend the hearing.
