Notice is hereby given that a meeting will be held in the Commission Room of the Municipal Building on Monday, February 7, 1955, at 10:00 o'clock a.m. to hear suggestions and objections to the proposed vacation of a small portion of West Street Right-of-Way to eliminate certain sharp curves.

Resolved That the City Manager be and he is hereby authorized to execute the same.

WHEREAS, the City Commission has been requested to improve West Street from Webster Street to the City and Webster Street from US-16 to Adams Road;

WHEREAS, the City Manager has recommended, and owners of adjacent property have informally approved, a re-design of the West Street Right-of-Way to eliminate certain sharp curves;

WHEREAS, such re-designing of said street, and vacating of a small parcel adjacent to lots 31 and 32 on the east side of West Street;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT HEREBY ORDERED that this Commission deem it advisable to consider a certain and establishing the following described parcel of property, presently located in West Street Right-of-Way:

That portion of West Street abutting lots 31 and 32 of Adams Park Subdivision, City of Birmingham, Oakland County, Michigan, as recorded in Book 14 of plats on page 26, Oakland County records, more particularly described as follows:

Beginning at a point in the westerly line of lot 31 of said Adams Park Subdivision, said point being in the easterly line of West Street, said point being South 114.4 feet from the southeast corner of said lot 31;

Thence on a curve to the left, whose chord bears N 10° 37' W a distance of 21.14 feet, with a radius of 21.14 feet, a central angle of 21.14°, a tangent distance of 10.57 feet and an arc distance of 21.65 feet, to a point in the westerly line of lot 32 of Adams Park Subdivision, said point also being in the easterly line of West Street, said point being 82.11 feet, 4.64 feet from the northeast corner of said lot 32;

Thence S 21° 14' E, along the easterly line of West Street, 10.57 feet to a point on the easterly line of West Street, along the easterly line of West Street, 10.57 feet to the point of beginning.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that this Commission shall meet Monday, February 7, 1955, in the Commission Room in the Municipal Building for the purpose of hearing any and all objections and vacating and abolishing of said right-of-way.
