AAUW Sponsors Noted Lecturer In Local Talk

A subject high in current interest—"De-Segregation in Our Schools"—has been chosen by AAUW's guest speaker, Dr. Margaret Just Butcher, associate professor of English at the University of South Florida.

The February program has been designed as the social studies meeting and the speaker will be introduced by Mrs. J. R. Wagner, chairman.

Dr. Butcher was featured speaking on the subject at the New York Herald Tribune Forum on De-Segregation in New York City last October.

SHE was a Fulbright lecturer in France in 1949-50 for the State Department and is a regular lecturer at Washington International center, an orientation center for foreign guests sponsored by the State Department and the American Council on Education.

Dr. Butcher has a number of published articles to her credit. Her work has appeared in School and Society, The Record (official magazine of the U.S. Department of State), Journal of Negro Education and the Bulletin of Institute of International Education.

Two out of three articles written for the "Survey" have been reprinted and distributed overseas by the International Information Service, State Department.

Listed in the "Dictionary of American Scholars," Dr. Butcher numbers many organizations of which she is a member. They include American Studies Association, American Association of University Women, American Association of University Professors, National Council of Negro Women, Alpha Kappa Alpha Society, Pi Lambda Theta (Educational honorary society), National Association of College Women, Washington College club and National Association for Advancement of Colored People.
