Plans for the charter dinner are already underway with an early spring date being considered.

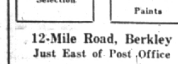

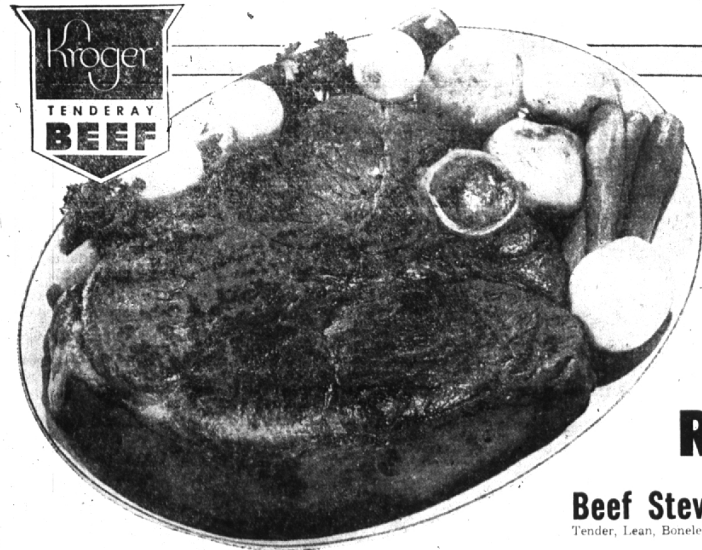
