Quarton PTA Opens Series On Family

Dr. Harold F. Powell, associate professor of Educational Psychology at Wayne university, comes to Quarton school Wednesday, Jan. 19, to speak on a topic of great interest to parents in the community. His talk at 8 P.M. will be "Goals and Ideals We Have For Our Children and Successful Ways to Achieve Them." In 1952, as resident of Birmingham and a father of children in the Birmingham school system, he has a great awareness of family and community needs in the area.

The program, with Dr. Powell, is the first of three, to be conducted in three consecutive weeks, which will feature Quarton's school first family institute.

THE SECOND program will be Wednesday, Jan. 26, at 1:30 p.m., with Dr. Mildred Peters, associate professor at Wayne College of Education, on "Helping the Aggressive Child to Use His Aggression in a Positive Way."

The third program will be Wednesday, Feb. 2, at 1:30 p.m. with Dr. Joseph F. Schoff, consultant at the Child Guidance Clinic, Fontaine, speaking on "The Withdrawn Child."

At both afternoon sessions four special visiting teachers will be available for consultation, following the lectures. Ms. Beba Cope and Mrs. Carolyn Lougtran from the Birmingham schools' special services departments, and Mrs. Elgia Ward and Mrs. Nell Shinn, from the Van Dyke public school's special services department, will be present to serve in this capacity.
