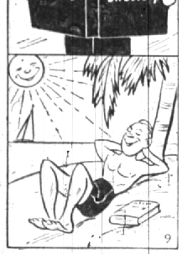

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Professor To Discuss Family Ties

John Sullivan, professor of educational psychology at Wayne University, will speak to members of the Birming PTA on Tuesday, Feb. 18. His talk at 8 p. m. in the school auditorium will be on "The Family and the Child."

The strength and weaknesses of family ties in the world today and ways to counteract conflicting influences will be discussed. Mr. Sullivan's talk will also cover the need for discipline and control and the importance of the means used to arrive at controls. He will show how people in the past thought of controls and how modern psychological thought approaches the same problems.

The practical and specific application of psychological theories concerning children and their parents will be emphasized by Mr. Sullivan. There will be a period for questions following his talk.

Mr. Sullivan has been with Wayne university since 1927. Previously he taught at Teachers College Columbia University. He received his MA and his PhD degrees from Columbia University, and is the author of numerous articles.

Miss Butler is a recent graduate of Michigan State college. Her fiancé, a former student at MSC, is with the Army at Arlington, Va., and will be discharged in June.

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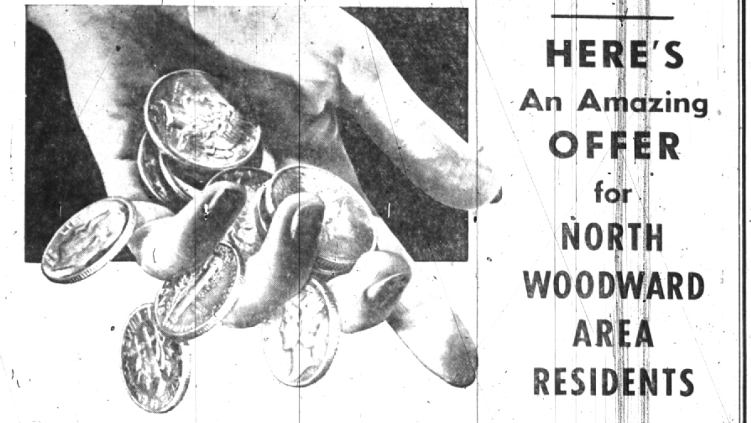


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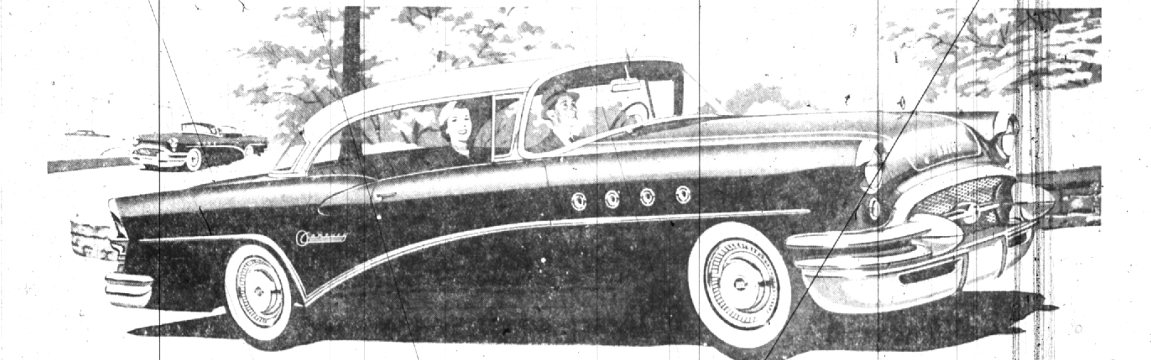
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
