RO Township Vote School Site Set for Monday

South Oakland county residents will be watching closely the results of Monday's special election in Royal Oak township.

On that day the last large parcel of Royal Oak township will be against an incorporation vote. Residents will vote on whether the 7 1/2 square mile township shall become the City of Madison Heights. The entire area bounded by Ten Mile, Dequindre, Campbell and the east border of the City of Royal Oak, except for a 2 1/2 acre site divided in the incorporation proceedings.

Should the area vote in favor of city rule and elect nine charter commissioners from the 19 candidates, two small parcels of township land will still be excluded. One parcel is the Oakdale Garden project on Eight Mile road, once owned by the government as a housing project, and now operated by the township. The second is a much smaller piece of property at the north-east corner of Ten Mile and Greenfield, nearly surrounded by the City of Oak Park and bordering Southfield township.

Pedestrian Hit In Bloomfield

A 48-year-old Detroit man who was seriously injured in a Bloomfield Hills accident, remained in only fair condition Tuesday at St. Joseph Mercy hospital, Pontiac. Police said Arthur M. Hitchings stepped into the path of a car at Woodward and Long Lake road Tuesday afternoon. The driver, Horace Walter, 41, 309 of Detroit, spied a station wagon in the intersection and was not told Hitchings suffered abdominal injuries, three broken ribs and a broken left arm.

Funds Approved For Interceptor

BLOOMFIELD HILLS — City commission Tuesday night voted to appropriate \$12,228 as its share of the cost of preliminary engineering work on the proposed Greenfield interceptor sewer. This amount represents the city's share of a \$30,000 total required to begin work on the sewer. Commission also approved the appointment of a three-man electrical inspection board, consisting of Charles Pierce, John Carroll and Homer Murphy to enforce the recently adopted electrical code. City voters will also pass on three charter amendments in the April 4 election, after commission action. The first will permit payment of special assessments over a 20-year period instead of the present 10-year limit.

Former Chaplain To Show Slides Of Passion Play

The world-famous "Passion Play" produced once each decade in Oberammergau, Germany, will be featured in a public showing of color slides at Birmingham Church of the Nazarene at 7:30 p.m. Jan. 17.

The narrator will be the Rev. E. W. Yarian, chaplain for the U.S. Air Force stationed in France. He has traveled through Europe and the British Isles, he personally visited the Bavarian village and took these pictures of the "Passion Play" as it was taking place last March. The play, first given in 1634, originated in the midst of the black plague which struck Europe during the Thirty Years' War. After Oberammergau was hit, the people pledged they would reenact the passion of Christ every ten years, until the end of time for the comfort of the suffering, the conversion of the "pagan" and continuation of their faith.

An old chronicle tells that after this, the plague ceased and the play was given the following year and has so continued each decade with the exception of years when Germany was at war. The Rev. E. W. Yarian, pastor of the local church, says churches of the Nazarene in the city of Pontiac are cooperating with the service. There will be special musical selections.
