Visiting in New York City, where she expects to stay, Mrs. Howell is Margie Player of East California drive.

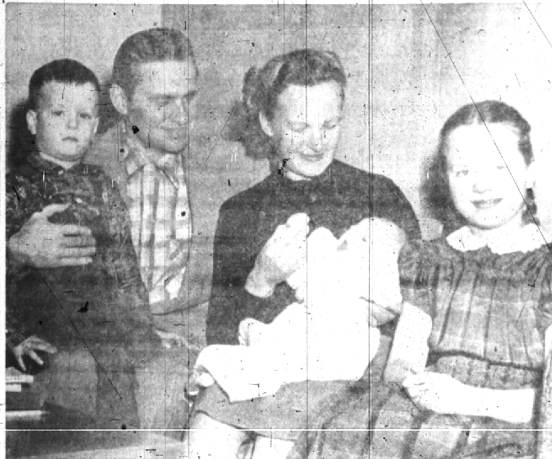

Former Lithuanian Writes Best Novel in '54 Contest

A new baby and a prize-winning novel proved just as full as more than Mrs. Edmund Arbas, 4255-Dover Road, had for herself over the Jan. 23 weekend.

Coinciding with the birth of her second daughter and third child, Mrs. Arbas had been notified that she had won top honors in the best Lithuanian novel of 1954 contest. She had been asked to come to Chicago Jan. 23 to receive her check.

"Naturally," she laughed, "I was too busy with my two youngest daughters to do it, so my husband went in my place."

Mrs. Arbas said it had taken her about eight months to write her book, "The Bird Song," but said it had been in her mind since 1941, a year or more before the war actually started. Printed in Lithuania, the book is for Lithuanian use.

"It is the story of my country and a young girl, woven together. The title refers to the brief span of freedom my country had, only about 20 years, and the young girl's life."
