Their co-workers are Wallace S. Gordon Saunders, Jr., Alan Sanders and Henry Jackson.

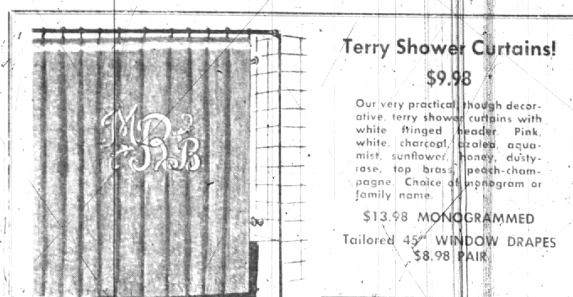
Activities Set By New Officers

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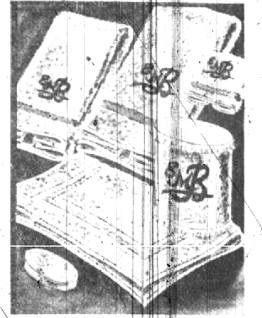
