League Sponsors Jan. 26 Blood Bank

Modifications of requirements for blood donors are brought to the attention of area residents as Birmingham's Junior League unit completes plans for the bank they sponsor at the Community House Jan. 26 from 2-8 p.m.

Persons are accepted between 18-50, with parental consent needed for minors unless they are members of the armed services. Minimum weight is 110 pounds, with blood pressure range between 400 and 200. Persons with allergies are acceptable providing they are currently free of symptoms and not taking treatment. Treatments requiring sulfis drugs, penicillin or arsenic administered within 30 days, bars a donor. Those having a history of jaundice, heart disease or malaria are not eligible.

MRS. JOHN BAGBY, chairman, said that due to the slackening of donors during the holidays the need for blood is especially acute at this time.

"Local banks," she explained, "try to maintain a reserve, but unless the incoming supply is constant, they are faced with a shortage."

"Banks held here permit a supply to be kept to meet the needs of area residents. A call placed with the Red Cross office at Pontiac should assure any resident of needed blood—if we do our part now."

"FURTHERMORE, those donating at this bank may designate where they wish the gift credited."

The League will offer a nursery to care for small children and are arranging for specially reserved parking areas for donors.

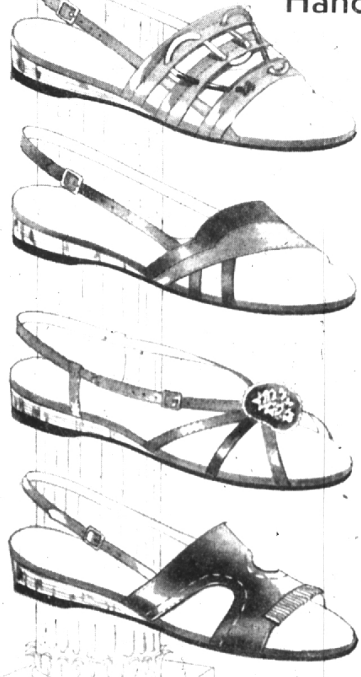
