



Drawling Caller Leads Tricks in Old Dances

"Yessir, ma'am, square dancing can be a lot of fun," draws Joseph P. Freeh who will be calling the Spotlighters' dances from 9 to 12 on January 28.

The Spotlighters are groups of three Catholic parishes in Birmingham who are sponsoring a series for member and non-member square-dance fans of all ages at the Birmingham Community House.

Freeh, who learned his old fashioned dancing methods at Pennsylvania State college and acquired his equally-switched-into southern accent during the war, at University of Georgia, calls many dances on weekend nights.

"Marching through Georgia" is favorite square dance of this call-

er, who makes it a point to lead the head couple through a new dance sequence before the music starts and his calls begin.

WHEN IT'S "THE GRAPVINE Twist," he takes the place of the "lead gent" and swings his lead through the windings among the other couples to show the way.

"Now there's a goode!" he says enthusiastically when "Dive for the Oyster" is mentioned. That dance is one where the lead couple dives beneath the arched arms of the second couple, then swing back and hold their arms up while the second couple "dives" for the call.

Freeh usually prefers dances to orchestra music such as that of Otto Brown's three-piece unit that will play for the Spotlighters' event, rather than to recorded music.

HOME IN BECKS county, Pennsylvania, after his college, Freeh began teaching school in Pleasant Valley after Pennsylvania State.

With square dancing he has learned in college, he started teaching students in his classes.

When he came to Birmingham in 1950, he continued his square dance hobby in hours after his work in the sales promotion department in the Factor and Implement division of Ford Motor company.

He, his wife and their son, Eric, 3, live at 1615 Enning. His sister, Margaret, is president of the Spotlighters.

WHEN THE FREEHS headed west on business last week they paused for a farmer's field-day in Illinois, where Freeh enrolled in a square dance class contest.

Calling before the 75,000 farm area residents, he won first prize with 11 calls.
