### Minor Damages In Multiple Alarm Fires

Two alarms within 19 minutes kept Birmingham firemen busy Tuesday night, extinguishing blazes at the home of Everett F. Schaffer, 603 Suffolk, and at the Birmingham high school.

The school alarm was at 7:21 when a basement fire broke out. Fire chief V. W. Griffith said flames from a paint thinner ignited as a member of the family lit a small fire in a basement work room.

Trying to carry the gallon can of thinner out of the house, Schaffer knocked second degree burns on one hand, Griffith said. Damage to the home was minor.

At 7:40 the alarm came in from the high school.

GRIFFITH SAID this fire apparently started when canvas being used as a keratin burning in a manner being used to cover newly laid concrete in the courtyard.

Stray over the concrete, a small section of wood scaffolding and the canvas in the wood construction area were the only damages.

## Obituary Notices

WILL CLAIRE ALDRICH, 79, died in Tampa, Fla., Jan. 22. Son of the late George F. and Mary A. Aldrich, he was born Oct. 11, 1875, in Royal Oak. He moved to Birmingham with his family in 1881 and attended the Hill school until 1902.

At the age of 16 he took a job as an apprentice printer with the Birmingham Evening, which at that time was printed in the building now occupied by Shaik's Drug store, by its publishers, Whitehead and Mitchell. In 1894 he went to the Pontiac Gazette where he worked as his first duty.

Mr. Aldrich returned to The Eccentric in 1907, taking charge of the printing department of a weekly salary of \$7.50.

He became associated with the Detroit Gasket Co. in 1913 and remained there until 1925. In 1927 he accepted the position of chief of the printing department of Whitman and Barnes, makers of cutting tools, and remained there until his retirement in 1947, at which time he moved to Florida.

Mr. Aldrich married Carrie M. VanAvery of Birmingham in 1903. Following cremation in Florida, interment will be in Greenwood cemetery.

DAVID A. GREEN, 92, a former member of the state legislature died Monday. His home was at 1817 Washington, Pontiac.

He was the father of Mrs. William C. Range of Bloomfield Hills. His wife, in addition to his widow, the former Mary A. Hagerman, whom he married Nov. 18, 1881, in Royal Oak, had a son, A. Wendell Green of Watkins lake; three grandchildren and three great-grandchildren and a brother, Harry L. Green of Pontiac.

Funeral services will be conducted at 2 p.m. today from the Palmer-Shover funeral home, Pontiac. Burial will follow in Oakdale Park cemetery with the Knights Templar conducting the graveside service.

Born in Bloomfield township, Nov. 2, 1862, he was graduated from Birmingham high school.

Mr. Green lived his entire life in Oakland county. He had been active in the Republican Party, having served in the state house of representatives from 1909 through 1913 and again in 1918-19. He had also served two terms as a member of Oakland county board of supervisors.

MRS. JEANNETTE MCCLINTOCK OSBURN, widow of Wallace N. Osburn, and a former resident of Birmingham, was killed in an accident at Sarasota, Fla., Jan. 21.

Mrs. Osburn was riding with her 21-year-old son, Frank D. Nicol, another former resident, who reported the accident.

She was a native of Pittsburgh, Pa., and about three years ago moved to Los Angeles, where she was employed by the Wm. R. Hamilton company chapel in Detroit Friday, with services and burial at Elmwood cemetery on Tuesday.

Mrs. Osburn was a member of the Woman's City club and Christ Church, Frankfort.

GRACE T. PELISSIER, 54, of 1287 Villa, died Jan. 19 at her residence.

Survivors include his wife, Anna; two brothers, Rev. Messrs. Albert A. C. Pelissier of Iron Mountain and Philip L. of Ames, Iowa; and three sons, Ernest of Peoria, Edna of Iron Mountain and Mrs. Frank Vivian of Ames.

The body was taken to Marquette for services and burial. Arrangements were by Bell chapel of William R. Hamilton Co.

MR. PELISSIER was born Jan. 4, 1861, in Mansfield. He was employed by the Truck and Coach division of General Motors for 15 years. He was a member of Holy Name church, Knights of Columbus and the Royal Oak B.P.O.
