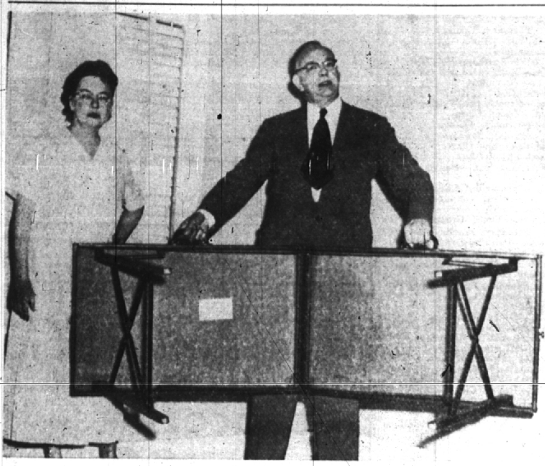

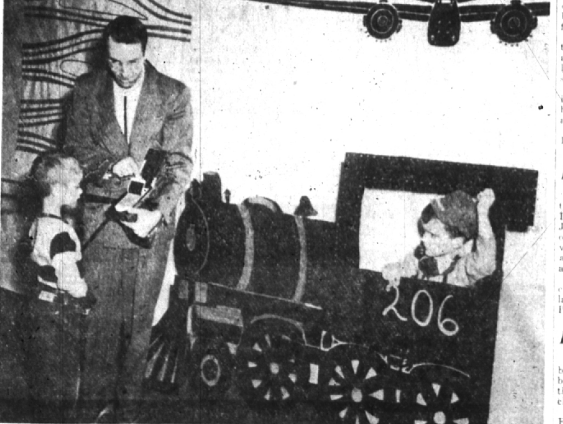
How it serves communities and how the organizations can assist will be explained by Mrs. James Conway, director of the Volunteer Bureau of Lansing.
