

Slate Conservation Talks For Farm, Garden Members

Mrs. Lowrie is past chairman of conservation in the Birmingham branch and now is a member of the conservation committee in the Federated Garden clubs of Michigan.

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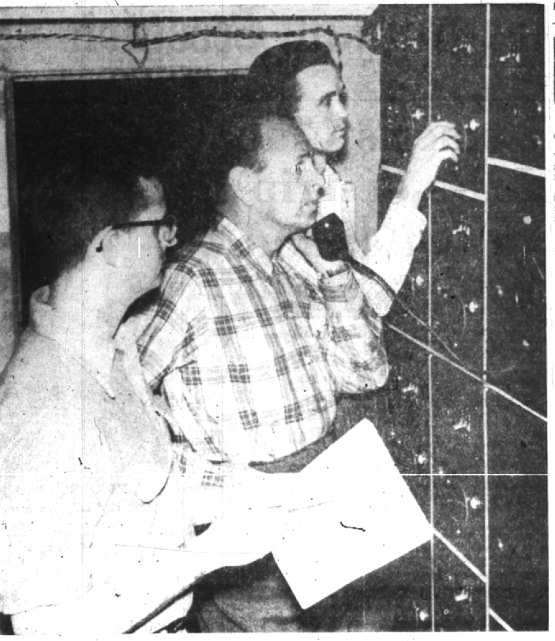

Light crew tests new control panel

Inaugurate New Control Board

Feb. 11 not only marks the opening of "Country Girl" by St. Dunstan's Girls' Play, but also is the debut of the new lighting control system at the Pavilion.

Described by members as the finest in the state used by any amateur theatrical group, the board was constructed during the summer and fall by guild members headed by Jim Schneider.

The board was designed by Charles Geig, who moved to the west coast a short time ago.

"This play," Schneider said, "will give us a chance to really test the board. Staging Country Girl can be greatly improved with extra good lighting to assist in the dramatic tension of an alcoholic actor's fight to regain the spotlight."

SCHNEIDER SAID the new control system enables the director to control lighting in the rear-arranged areas, resulting in very flexible staging and outfit variations in time and color.

There are 21 circuits on the board, all controlled by automatic timers. Lights may be grouped by stage areas for special emphasis on any scene or act of action.

"Other adjustments," Schneider explained, "are a sound-proofed light booth, telephone and speaker communications with the crew and automatic dimming for house lights."

Among the crew who helped bring home control of the board are Lew Keenan, Jr., John Kise, Fred Hendrick, Bill Harvey Jackson, Bart Conner, Bob Peck, Matthew Smith and N. S. Huggins.
