Her husband's parents are Mr. and Mrs. William H. Harvies of Santa Barbara, Beverly Hills.

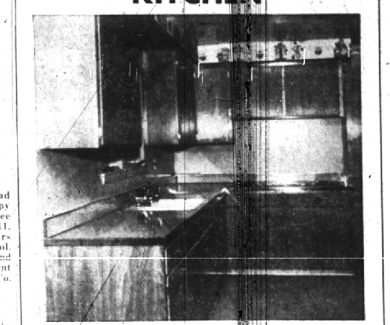
